



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

Subarea Committee

- Chaired by FOSCs and SOSCs
- Development and maintenance of effective Subarea Plans
- Plan revisions and consistency [VCPs, FCPs, OSRPs]
- Assimilation of Outreach to public and State, Tribe and Local responders/stakeholders
- Exercises
- FOSC Guidance
- Leadership over workgroups and taskforces

When an Oil Spill Enters the Environment

- Critical Decisions on Environmental Trade-off
 - Unified Command
 - Environmental Unit
 - Tribes and Trustees
- Sensitive Areas
 - Near shore vs deep water
 - Surface vs subsurface risks and sensitivities
 - Keeping oil off the shoreline

Oil Spill Response Options

- National Contingency Plan, subpart J
 - Removing oil from the environment by mechanical recovery is the preferred cleanup option, however due to limitations, all oil spill cleanup tools must be available.
 - Mechanical oil recovery
 - In Situ Burn
 - Dispersants
 - Bioremediation


Goal to Enhance Tribal Involvement
